To: Ontario municipalities affected by the Heads and Beds Payment-in-Lieu of Taxes Program

RE: Heads and Beds Payment-in-Lieu of Taxes Program – Municipal Collaboration Opportunity

On behalf of the Town of Penetanguishene, I am writing to share the enclosed Council resolution regarding the Heads and Beds Payment-in-Lieu of Taxes (PILT) program and to invite your municipality to participate in a collective discussion on this matter.

The Heads and Beds PILT program, originally established in 1970 and last updated in 1987, to \$75 per head/bed for provincially owned institutional facilities. As you may be aware, this rate has remained unchanged for nearly four decades and has not kept pace with inflation, municipal service responsibilities, or other Provincial PILT programs.

As a result, municipalities hosting these facilities continue to experience growing financial pressures, as the funding received does not reflect the true cost of providing essential municipal services.

The Town of Penetanguishene has made continuous efforts over several years to seek a fair and reasonable resolution to this matter, including multiple delegations with the Ministry of Finance. Despite these efforts, the current system remains, in our view, both outdated and inequitable.

We recognize that Penetanguishene is not alone in facing these challenges. Other municipalities across Ontario may be experiencing similar financial impacts as a result of this outdated program. As part of our ongoing advocacy efforts, we are reaching out to municipalities that receive Heads and Beds PILT funding to gauge interest in participating in a collective discussion. The intent is to determine whether there is a shared municipal interest in pursuing a collaborative advocacy approach with the Provincial Government to seek a complete review of the program and a fair and equitable solution.

If your municipality is interested in taking part in a joint discussion, or if you wish to share your experience on this issue, we welcome the opportunity to connect. WHEREAS the Heads and Beds Payment-in-Lieu of Taxes program was established in 1970 at a fixed rate of \$25 per full-time university student, increased to \$50 in 1973 when hospitals and provincial correctional facilities were included, and last increased in 1987 to \$75 per head/bed; and

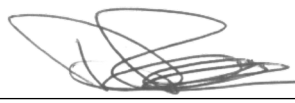
WHEREAS the fixed rate has remained unchanged for nearly four decades and has not kept pace with inflation, which would place the rate at approximately \$180 today; and

WHEREAS the Heads and Beds Payment-in-Lieu of Taxes has also not kept pace with provincially mandated municipal service responsibilities or other Provincial payment-in-lieu programs that are based on property assessment and municipal tax rates; and

WHEREAS the Town of Penetanguishene has formally requested regulatory amendments through multiple delegations with the Ministry of Finance, seeking a fair and reasonable resolution to the current situation, which the Town considers to be unfair and unreasonable; and

WHEREAS the Town is of the opinion that a complete and thorough review of the Heads and Beds Payment-in-Lieu of Taxes program is necessary to ensure municipalities and

Dear Heads of Council, Chief Administrative Officers and Clerks of OPP-Policed Municipalities:

I am writing to provide you with an update on OPP municipal policing costs for 2027.

Our government recognizes the importance of providing municipalities with predictability as you plan your budgets, while ensuring the OPP has the resources it requires to continue delivering high-quality policing services and keeping communities safe.

With that in mind, we are taking action to limit increases in OPP policing costs for municipalities in 2027.

For the 2027 calendar year, no OPP-policed municipality will see its total amount owed for OPP policing increase by more than 11 per cent compared to 2026, excluding costs associated with any additional policing services a municipality has chosen to receive through a separate agreement with the OPP.

This is a time-limited measure for the 2027 OPP billing cycle, intended to provide municipalities with cost certainty to support local budget planning.

To implement this change, an amendment has been made to Ontario Regulation 413/23: Amount Payable by Municipalities for Policing from Ontario Provincial Police, made under the *Community Safety and Policing Act, 2019* (CSPA). The amendment is being filed with the Registrar of Regulations and will be publicly available through the [e-Laws](#) page in the coming days.

The OPP is currently preparing 2027 annual billing statements, which are expected to be provided to municipalities this fall.

We value the important partnership between the province, municipalities and the OPP in keeping Ontario communities safe. We also recognize the importance of ensuring policing costs are sustainable and predictable for municipalities, and we will continue working with our municipal partners on these shared priorities.

- e. Request that Administration report back to Council, as appropriate, on participation in the initiative, potential opportunities identified, and any recommendations for future action.
- f. Direct the Clerk to forward a copy of this resolution to the Federation of Canadian Municipalities, the local Member of Parliament, the provincial municipal association, and neighbouring municipalities for information and consideration.

Council recognizes the important role that municipalities can play in addressing housing affordability and homelessness and supports collaborative efforts that increase opportunities for affordable and non-market housing across Canada.

Re: Funding for Official Plan and Comprehensive Zoning By-law Reviews

Dear Premier Ford,

On behalf of the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Latchford, I am writing to provide you with a copy of Resolution No. 26/150, adopted by Council on August 18, 2026.

Small, rural and northern municipalities require current Official Plans and Zoning By-laws to support housing, attract investment, encourage economic development and responsibly plan for infrastructure and municipal services. However, completing comprehensive reviews of these documents can place a significant financial burden on municipalities with limited tax bases, staffing capacity and financial resources.

The Town of Latchford recently applied to the Northern Ontario Heritage Fund Corporation for assistance with modernizing its land-use planning framework. The Town was advised that stand-alone studies are not eligible under the current program guidelines. This funding gap may force smaller municipalities to delay necessary planning updates or redirect limited municipal funds away from other essential services.

Council is respectfully requesting that the Government of Ontario establish a dedicated, sustainable and recurring funding program to assist municipalities with the costs of reviewing and updating Official Plans and Comprehensive Zoning By-laws. The program should recognize the differing financial and administrative capacities of municipalities and provide enhanced assistance to small, rural, northern and lower-tier municipalities.

Eligible expenses should include professional planning services, technical studies, public and Indigenous consultation where applicable, mapping and geographic information system updates, growth analyses, servicing and infrastructure assessments, and other supporting work required to develop modern and effective planning documents.

We respectfully ask your government to recognize Official Plans and Zoning By-laws as critical housing-enabling and economic development infrastructure. Providing municipalities with the resources to complete this important work will help remove barriers to development, create greater certainty for residents and investors, and better position communities across Ontario for responsible and sustainable growth.

Thank you for your consideration of this request. We would welcome the opportunity to discuss this matter further with you or the appropriate provincial representatives.

Whereas, municipalities are required to plan for responsible growth, housing, economic development, infrastructure, environmental protection and the long-term needs of their communities through comprehensive land-use planning documents, including Official Plans and Zoning By-laws;

And whereas, Official Plans and Zoning By-laws must be periodically reviewed and updated to ensure they remain consistent with current provincial legislation, policies, community needs, development pressures and opportunities for economic growth;

And whereas, the cost of undertaking comprehensive Official Plan and Zoning By-law reviews can represent a significant financial burden, particularly for small, rural and northern municipalities with limited tax bases, staffing capacity and financial resources;

And whereas, outdated planning documents can create barriers to residential, commercial and industrial development, limit a municipality's ability to respond to changing economic opportunities, and make it more difficult to identify and prepare lands for future growth;

And whereas, modern and current planning documents provide municipalities, residents, businesses and investors with greater certainty regarding where and how development can occur and allow municipalities to proactively plan for housing, employment lands, infrastructure and municipal services;

And whereas, investment in municipal planning is an investment in economic development, housing readiness and community growth, as updated Official Plans and Zoning By-laws can help municipalities remove unnecessary barriers to development and establish clear policies to support new investment;

And whereas, the Town of Latchford applied to the Northern Ontario Heritage Fund Corporation (NOHFC) for assistance with the modernization of its land-use planning framework and was advised that stand-alone studies are ineligible under the current NOHFC program guidelines;

And whereas, municipalities should not be required to choose between funding essential municipal services and undertaking the comprehensive planning work necessary to position their communities for future housing and economic growth;

Now therefore be it resolved that, the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Latchford hereby calls upon the Government of Ontario to establish a dedicated and

sustainable funding program to assist municipalities with the costs associated with reviewing, updating and modernizing Official Plans and Comprehensive Zoning By-laws;

And further that, such a funding program recognize the differing financial and administrative capacities of municipalities and provide enhanced funding opportunities for small, rural, northern and lower-tier municipalities where the cost of comprehensive planning reviews can represent a disproportionate burden on the municipal tax base;

And further that, eligible costs include, but not be limited to, professional planning services, technical studies and background reports required to support Official Plan and Zoning By-law reviews, public and Indigenous consultation where applicable, mapping and geographic information system updates, growth and development analysis, infrastructure and servicing assessments, and other supporting work necessary to establish modern and effective municipal planning documents;

And further that, the Province recognize municipal Official Plans and Zoning By-laws as critical economic development and housing-enabling infrastructure that provide the regulatory foundation necessary to support investment, development and sustainable community growth;

And further that, consideration be given to establishing a recurring funding intake so municipalities can undertake required planning reviews proactively rather than delaying necessary updates because of financial constraints;

And finally that, a copy of this resolution be circulated to the Premier of Ontario; the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing; the Minister of Finance; the Minister of Economic Development, Job Creation and Trade; the Minister of Northern Economic Development and Growth; the Minister of Infrastructure; the Federal Economic Development Agency for Northern Ontario (FedNor); John Vanthof, MPP for Timiskaming—Cochrane; Pauline Rochefort, MP Nipissing-Timiskaming; the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO); the Federation of Northern Ontario Municipalities (FONOM); the Northwestern Ontario Municipal Association (NOMA); the Rural Ontario Municipal Association (ROMA); and all municipalities in Ontario, requesting their support and endorsement of this resolution.

Dear Mayor, Members of Council and the Municipal Administration,

I am writing on behalf of Canadians for Safe Technology (C4ST) to draw your attention to an ongoing public consultation by the federal government on proposed changes to the current telecommunications (cell) tower antenna siting process. It appears that many municipalities and other land-use authorities (LUAs) were not directly informed of this consultation which closes on September 22, 2026. Only a small number of LUAs submitted comments so far, while major telecommunications companies like Bell Mobility, Rogers and TELUS have submitted detailed comments and recommendations supporting ISED's recommendation and asking for more concessions.

This imbalance matters because the proposed changes would directly affect LUAs as the changes are heavily weighted to benefit the telecommunications companies, while shifting the responsibility and workload to LUAs such as municipalities.

C4ST has been involved in cell tower siting situations for more than a decade and has seen first-hand the valuable contributions local residents and the municipalities provide in influencing cell tower decisions, including identifying alternate, more suitable sites while still satisfying the cell tower proponent's connectivity goals. We hope you agree that your local role should be retained.

The public consultation we are referring to is, [Consultation on Amendments to the Tower Siting Process and Decision on Roaming, Tower Sharing and Annual Reporting Requirements for Terrestrial Licences](#). DGSO-001-26. May 2026.

The proposed changes were initiated because of the federal government [Red Tape Review](#). ISED states the proposed amendments are intended to "*reduce the regulatory and administrative burden on wireless communication operators*".

Reducing this "*burden*" for "*communication operators*," in effect, transfers the "*burden*" to LUAs such as municipalities and their constituents.

WHAT COULD CHANGE FOR YOUR MUNICIPALITY?

If ISED's proposed changes are adopted, there will be a significant reduction of municipal authority and local decision-making. For example:

- The revised [CPC-2-0-03](#) would impose a **one-size-fits-all process** across Canada. All locally created antenna-siting processes, protocols and policies would be eliminated. We believe 50 LUA's across Canada have created their own, local process for cell tower siting.
- **Municipalities would be excluded from involvement** in the ISED approval process **for new cell towers less than 15 metres in height**. This exclusion now applies to non-commercial users such as Amateur Radio Operators. The proposed amendment would extend this exclusion to broadcasters, third party- tower owners and telecommunications carriers such as Bell Mobility, Rogers and TELUS. The consequence is that these towers could be built almost anywhere if there is a "willing landlord." These excluded towers would not be entered into ISED's online portal because no LUA or public consultation would be required.
- For towers over 15 metres in height, LUAs such as municipalities would have **only 45 calendar days** to review proposals and consult residents, reduced from the current 120-day period. Failure to respond within that timeframe would result in **automatic approval** of the cell tower. The shortened timelines would make it much more difficult to identify and evaluate alternate

sites, and for local elected officials and staff to become fully informed. Motivation for telecommunications companies to work collaboratively with LUAs to find an alternate site would be diminished.

- Municipalities would be **restricted to a narrow, federally prescribed set of reasons** when explaining a decision of non-concurrence (non-agreement).
- The **Dispute Resolution Process** would favour the cell tower proponents because the onus will be on the LUA to trigger the process although it is the cell tower proponent who is seeking the concurrence (agreement).

Our summary of these and other key issues can be read [HERE](#).

Several telecommunications-industry respondents are requesting further concessions, such as more exemptions from local consultation, reduced or less visible public notification requirements, and stricter limits on the concerns municipalities may consider. Following are three quotes from July 16, 2026 submissions about reducing the timeframe for considering an application from 120 days to 30 or 45 days, as well as increasing the height of cell towers that would be **excluded entirely from municipality involvement and public notification and consultation as part of the approval process**:

Bell Mobility: *"We recommend that ISED adopt a 30-calendar day timeframe for LUA concurrence ."* and *"... 15 metres . increase to 25 metres."*

Rogers: *" . supports a 30 calendar day timeline ."* and *" . support increasing the 15 metre threshold to 25 metres in height ."*

TELUS: *"Deemed concurrence should be the default: ISED should establish that an LUAs failure to respond within the 45-day window triggers "Deemed Concurrence," allowing proponents to proceed immediately to construction and deployment, "* and *"Extend the exclusion floor from 15 metres to 20 metres ."*

SUBMITTING A RESPONSE TO ISED'S PUBLIC CONSULTATION AND SENDING A MESSAGE TO MINISTER OF INDUSTRY MELANIE JOLY

Considering the magnitude of ISED's proposed amendments and the far-reaching local impacts, our recommendation to ISED is that no changes should be made to CPC-2-0-03 until a broad study is completed. This has been done before. In 2003/2004 the federal government held country-wide meetings gathering feedback from all stakeholders and made changes to CPC-2-0-03 based on the 34 recommendations in the 250-page report, [The National Antenna Tower Policy Review](#) (Townsend Report).

Although it seems clear that a proper comprehensive study should be conducted; we believe that is unlikely. Hence, it is important for municipalities to **submit a reply to ISED before September 22, 2026** in case such a study is not conducted and ISED does proceed with its changes. If these proposed changes are made to CPC-2-0-03, they will be difficult to undo.

As far as we know, after this consultation there will be no further formal opportunities for municipalities to give input on what the revised CPC-2-0-03 would contain, so it is critical that municipalities and other LUAs make their preferences known now.

The first stage of the public consultation closed on July 16, 2026 with submissions made by telecommunications companies, municipalities, the Federation of Canadian Municipalities and others.

The second stage, called Reply Comments, is open until September 22, 2026 and provides interested parties with an opportunity to review and respond to the comments already submitted.

Dear Sir,

I am writing to request that the Ministry of the Environment, Conservation and Parks and the Resource Productivity & Recovery Authority (RPRA) undertake a review of the current regulatory framework governing one-pound single-use propane cylinders sold in Ontario.

Consumers purchasing these cylinders pay environmental stewardship or producer responsibility costs at the point of sale with the expectation that an appropriate end-of-life management system exists. In practice, however, accessible return and recycling opportunities for these cylinders are extremely limited across many parts of the province. Most retail locations that sell the cylinders do not accept them back, and consumers are often left with few or no practical disposal options.

As a result, municipalities have become the default managers of these products. Municipal waste facilities bear the responsibility, cost, and safety risks associated with collecting, storing, and managing these pressurized cylinders despite not being the producers or distributors of the product. Improper disposal also creates significant operational hazards at material recovery facilities, transfer stations, and landfills, including the risk of fires and equipment damage.

This situation appears inconsistent with the principles of Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR), which are intended to shift the financial and operational responsibility for post-consumer products from municipalities and taxpayers to producers. When consumers contribute to environmental handling costs at the time of purchase, there should be a convenient, accessible, and effective collection system available to ensure the product is managed responsibly at the end of its useful life.

I respectfully request that the Ministry and RPRA review the current requirements applicable to one-pound propane cylinders and consider the following:

- Assess whether the existing producer responsibility system provides sufficient and accessible return opportunities for consumers throughout Ontario.
- Evaluate whether the fees collected from consumers are being used to establish an effective province-wide collection and recycling network.

- Require producers and retailers to provide convenient and publicly accessible take-back locations wherever these products are sold.
- Review whether municipalities are being unfairly burdened with the costs and liabilities associated with managing these products.
- Consider regulatory amendments to strengthen producer accountability and ensure the objectives of Ontario's circular economy and waste diversion policies are being achieved.

Municipalities should not be left to absorb the financial costs, operational challenges, and public safety risks associated with products for which producers have collected environmental stewardship fees. A well-functioning producer responsibility system should ensure that consumers have practical disposal options and that municipalities are not forced to subsidize the end-of-life management of these products.

I appreciate your consideration of this matter and would welcome the opportunity to discuss this issue further or provide examples of the challenges municipalities continue to face regarding the management of one-pound propane cylinders.

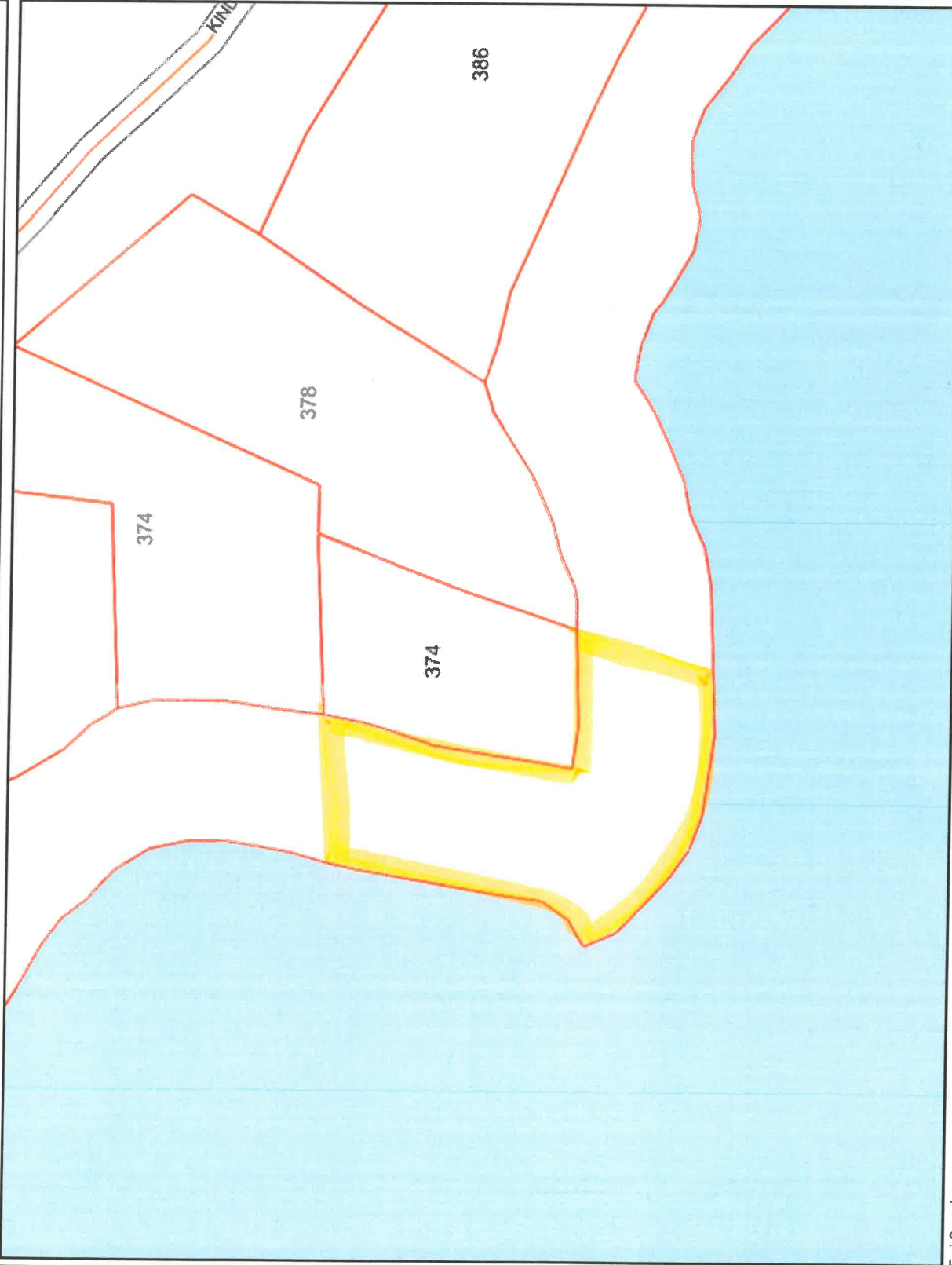

Being a By-Law to Appoint a Chief Building Official

WHEREAS subsection 3(1) of the *Building Code Act, 1992*, SO 1992, c 23, provides that the Council of each municipality is responsible for the enforcement of the *Building Code Act, 1992*, in the municipality, except as where otherwise provided for in the *Act*;

AND WHEREAS subsection 3(2) of the *Building Code Act, 1992*, SO 1992, c 23, directs the Council of each municipality to appoint a Chief Building Official and such Inspectors as are necessary for the enforcement of the *Building Code Act, 1992*, in the areas in which the municipality has jurisdiction;

NOW THEREFORE the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Brudenell, Lyndoch and Raglan enacts as follows:

1. That Andrew Jessup be appointed the Chief Building Official for the Corporation of the Township of Brudenell, Lyndoch and Raglan.
2. This bylaw supercedes any preceding by-law appointing individuals to this position.
3. This bylaw takes effect on the day of its final passing.

Code of Conduct for Building Officials

Preamble

The Code of Conduct applies to the Chief Building Official and inspectors appointed under the Building Code Act in the exercise of a power or the performance of a duty under the Building Code Act or the Building Code. The purpose of this Code is to promote appropriate standards of behavior and enforcement actions to ensure building officials apply standards of honesty and integrity, and to prevent practices constituting an abuse of power including unethical or illegal practices.

Standards of Conduct

Building Officials undertake to:

1. Always act in the public interest, particularly with regards to the safety of building works and structures.
2. Not to act where there may be or where there may reasonably appear to be a conflict between their duties to their employer, their profession, their peers and the public at large and their personal interests.
3. Apply all relevant building by-laws, codes and standards appropriately and without favour.
4. Perform their inspections and plan examination duties impartially and in accordance with the highest professional standards.
5. At all times abide by the highest moral and ethical standards and avoiding any conduct, which could bring or tend to bring Building Officials into disrepute.
6. Comply with the provisions of the Building Code Act, the Ontario Building Code and other Acts or Laws which regulate or govern Building Officials or their functions.
7. Not to act beyond their personal level of competence or outside their area of expertise.
8. Maintain current accreditation to act as an Ontario Building Official.
9. Maintain their knowledge and understanding of the best current building practices, the building laws and Codes relevant to their inspection and plan examination function.
10. Extend professional courtesy to all.

Breaches of the Code of Conduct

The Ontario Building Code Act provides that the performance of Building Officials will be measured against this Code of Conduct. The Municipal administration will review any allegations brought forward that the Code of Conduct has been breached. Disciplinary action arising from violations of this Code of Conduct is the responsibility of the Municipal employer and will be based on the severity and frequency of the violation in accordance with relevant employment standards.
